**Spoon Playing** has been used to make rhythmic percussion music since ancient times. The Roman, Greek and ancient Egyptians all played spoons. The spoons can be classified as an idiophone. The idiophone is an instrument made of a resonant solid material. When it is struck, shaken or scraped, the whole thing vibrates to produce a sound. Gongs, bells, castanets and rattles are all classified as idiophones.




**Maureen** enjoys her arts and crafts and is happy to show off her latest masterpiece.

The more they talked, the more he ate


