




A lovely touch was the *meet-and-greet* at the end of the performance. Allowing our residents to get up close and personal with the cast. It really topped off a wonderful performance.

### Determination Wins Out


One gritty Lady has bounced back from a nasty fall earlier this year.


**Port Lincoln Singers**




